
A Christmas Poetry Reading.

Fr Bernard will read from his recent poetry collection 'Into the Golden Light.' Musical interludes will be provided by David O'Doherty.




Remembrance Mass

HISTORY

Our next Talk (Kilmacanogue History Society) is scheduled for Monday November 3rd. at 8pm in Kilmacanogue Parish Hall. The subject will be of considerable interest for people from Bray and North Wicklow area, as it will concern Reginald Brabazon, 12th Earl of Meath and the Countess of Meath, Mary Jane Maitland. It includes their philanthropic activities related to Bray Town Hall and the People's Park, the Hospital Saturday Fund and provision of housing in the Earl of Meath's Liberties in Dublin. The history of Killruddery House and Estate will feature, as well as the legend of Queen Victoria's visit in 1900, also an account of the Land Acts and survival of Killruddery Estate. It promises to be a fascinating Talk by our Speaker Sean J. Murphy, Author, Historian and Genealogist.

We are delighted to report that The Heritage Department of Wicklow County Council have commenced repair works to the Old Church Ruins in our Old Graveyard.

Phase one will see the Gable wall's being lowered and boxed in to reinforce the structure and make it safe. This will allow us to reopen the graveyard to Parishioners and visitors.

All stone is being saved and recorded to allow for further phases of restoration in the future.

The ant and the contact lens



Brenda was a young woman who was invited to go rock climbing. Although she was scared to death, she went with her group to a tremendous granite cliff. In spite of her fear, she put on the gear, took a hold on the rope, and started up the face of that rock. Well, she got to a ledge where she could take a breather. As she was hanging on there, the safety rope snapped against Brenda's eye and knocked out her contact lens. Well, here she is on a rock ledge, with hundreds of feet below her and hundreds of feet above her. Of course, she looked and looked and looked, hoping it had landed on the ledge, but it just wasn't there. Here she was, far from home, her sight now blurry. She was desperate and began to get upset, so she prayed to the Lord to help her to find it. When she got to the top, a friend examined her eye and her clothing for the lens, but there was no contact lens to be found. She sat down, despondent, with the rest of the party, waiting for the rest of them to make it up the face of the cliff. She looked out across range after range of mountains, thinking of that Bible verse that says, "The eyes of the Lord run to and for throughout the whole earth." She thought, "Lord, you can see all these mountains. You know every stone and leaf, and You know exactly where my contact lens is. Please help me."

Finally, they walked down the trail to the bottom. At the bottom, there was a new party of climbers just starting up the face of the cliff. One of them shouted out, "Hey, you guys!
